Management

Forest owners are granted compensation to make their forests available as protected areas. Since 2005 designation of protected areas have been in voluntary form. Forest owners can submit for consideration the whole, or a part of their forest for conservation. A biological assessment is carried out and considered according to reserve requirements. Compensation is negotiated between forest owner and the county governor, based on calculation of the timber value, site quality, operating cost etc. The ownership of the reserve remains to forest owner, but the owner has to relinquish all rights to forestry activities in perpetuity.
